Abe's hometown

Meet Springfield's best-known resident and revered icon

Two centuries after his birth, Springfield's best-known resident remains a revered icon, a leader who bore the weight of destiny to his untimely demise. Born in dire poverty and self-educated, Abraham Lincoln rose to lead our nation during its darkest time. His words inspired Americans during the Civil War, and they inspire us today.

Lincoln was born in Kentucky, grew up in Indiana and came into his own in Illinois. As a young man, he arrived in New Salem. A year later, he was elected captain of a militia company in the Black Hawk Indian wars. When the pioneer village helped elect Lincoln to the state legislature, he had to borrow money to purchase a suit. At the age of 28 he moved to Springfield without enough money to buy a bed. Through initiative, hard work and talent, he became an established and respected lawyer, was elected to the U.S. Congress, debated Stephen Douglas in an unsuccessful bid for the U.S. Senate, and in 1860 was elected the 16th president of the United States.

As Lincoln left for the nation's capital in 1861 and the Civil War appeared imminent, he prophetically told a crowd assembled at the train station in Springfield: "I now leave, not knowing when, or whether ever, I may return, with a task before me greater than that which rested on Washington."

After Lincoln's assassination, a grieving nation cast him as a mythic figure. Over the years Springfield has become a destination for many American pilgrimages. But in Lincoln's hometown you'll find not only the remnants of Honest Abe the railsplitter, you'll also discover a more complex, shrewd and wondrous man than the one likely encountered in your high school textbooks.

Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum

212 N. Sixth St. 217-558-8948 presidentlincoln.illinois.gov Admission Whether you're a Lincoln researcher or just curious about the life of the Great Emancipator, you should begin your visit at the museum, on the northeast corner of Jefferson and Sixth streets. The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum parking ramp is off Sixth Street between Madison and Mason streets.

All museum exhibits are located on the ground floor, and all facilities are in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. On the entryway floor, a compass points visitors to the plaza where the historical tour begins. Visitors see a replica of Lincoln's boyhood home in Indiana and the front of the White House as it appeared in 1861. From that sunny atrium-like area, with its 70-foot ceiling, visitors may proceed to any of the display areas.

This state-of-the-art facility was carefully designed with exacting historical detail. Amazingly wellpreserved artifacts tell the entire life story of our nation's 16th President. Dedicated to the life and legacy of Abraham Lincoln, the Presidential Museum, unlike any other in the U.S., features high-tech exhibits, interactive displays, and multimedia programs, as well as a reproduction of the White House as it looked in 1861.

The holographic and special effects theaters will entertain, educate and mesmerize you with ghostly images, live actors and high action. Witness the 1860 Presidential Election as though it were happening today, complete with television news coverage and campaign commercials.

Items from the institution's world-class Lincoln Collection, numbering in the tens of thousands, are exhibited on a rotating basis in the Museum's Treasures Gallery, including an original hand-written copy of the Gettysburg Address, the evening gloves in President Lincoln's pocket the night he was assassinated, and the quill pen used to sign the Emancipation Proclamation.

In Mrs. Lincoln's Attic, kids can play with a model of the Lincoln Home, try on period clothing, perform chores from the 1800s, and play with reproduction historic toys. They can also have their photos take with life-size models of Abraham Lincoln as a boy and an adult, as well as with Mary Todd and the Lincoln children.

Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library

The Lincoln Presidential Library is just across Jefferson Street from the museum and contains an overwhelming treasury of carefully preserved Lincoln documents and artifacts, including more than 12 million items from the Illinois State Historical Library. The Lincoln Collection is also housed in the library, as is the Papers of Abraham Lincoln research project.

The library is home to a rotating display of paintings, sculptures and other creations from local arts organizations. Whether learning more about the life and times of President Lincoln or following your own family's genealogical ties to Illinois, the Presidential Library is an amazing resource of information for families, historians and scholars.

Union Square Park

Union Square Park, also located across the street from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, is home to two Abraham Lincoln statues and "Acts of Intolerance," a sculpture by Preston Jackson commemorating the Springfield Race Riot of 1908. The park is the site of occasional concerts and special events hosted by the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

Lincoln Home National Historic Site

The National Park Service invites you to walk in the footsteps of Abraham Lincoln at Lincoln Home National Historic Site. Conveniently located in downtown Springfield, the four-square-block historic site is within easy walking distance of several other historic sites, hotels and restaurants.

In 1861, Abraham Lincoln left his home of 17 years - the only home he ever owned - to serve as the 16th President of the United States. The Lincoln Home has been completely restored to its 1860

Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum

Lincoln's Life in Letters (Coming in 2021)

At its heart, the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum is a showcase for the millions of items housed in its collection devoted to Illinois history and Abraham Lincoln. On any given day, at least 100 of those items are on display. Included in the collection are more than 1,600 documents in Lincoln's hand. Explore Lincoln's life through some of the documents that shaped the museum exhibits and the stories they tell.

Written by ALPLM historians, designed and created by ALPLM's exhibit team, *Lincoln's Life in Letters* will be installed throughout the first-floor atrium of ALPLM's Library building. Lincoln's life, from childhood through his presidency, will be told through his own correspondence in a semi-permanent display. The exhibit will feature 10 facsimiles of letters from ALPLM's collection which are curated and interpreted to help illuminate significant milestones in Lincoln's life.

appearance and reveals much about Lincoln as husband, father, neighbor and politician.

Tours of this national treasure are conducted by National Park Service Rangers. Free tickets are required for house tours and may be obtained at the Lincoln Home Visitors Center – which also houses a scaled model of 1860 Springfield. A complete tour of the historic site takes approximately two hours. Onsite parking is \$2 per hour, and admission to the Lincoln Home, exhibits and movies are free.

A variety of historic exhibits are located throughout the four-block neighborhood surrounding the Lincoln Home and can be viewed on a self-guided basis.

Old State Capitol

StateHistoricSitesOfSpringfieldIL Donations accepted Before his days as president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln spent countless hours at the building we now call the Old State Capitol. It is also the place where Lincoln served his final term (1840-1841) as an Illinois state legislator.

As an attorney, Lincoln tried several hundred cases before the Illinois Supreme Court housed here. It is also the site where Lincoln delivered his famous House Divided speech. During the 1860 presidential campaign, Lincoln used the Old State Capitol's governor's room as his headquarters. John Jones, Frances Gage and many other leaders worked here as well to expand the meaning of freedom in Illinois.

On May 3 and 4, 1865, following Lincoln's assassination, 75,000 mourners convened at the Old State Capitol to bid farewell as Lincoln's body was lying in state in the building's Representatives Hall.

In the 1960s, the Greek Revivalstyled building was reconstructed. Today, the first floor features a central hall flanked by rooms interpreting government offices, a library and the Supreme Court room. Also, a new video room and artifact gallery are located on the first floor. The second-floor rooms were recreated to include a magnificent rotunda, legislative chambers and smaller offices and meeting rooms. Visitors can take a 30-minute guided tour or view the rooms on their own. The State Historic Sites at Springfield are managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Office of Land Management.

Lincoln-Herndon Law Offices

The first floor has recently reopened as the Springfield Visitors Center, operated by Visit Springfield. Visitors can also see a re-creation of a post office that was in the building during Lincoln's time. The two upper floors are currently closed for reconstruction.

Though Lincoln practiced law at a variety of locations, Springfield's Lincoln-Herndon Law Office is the only such structure still in existence today. Originally designed as a commercial structure, Lincoln and law partner William H. Herndon rented space in the building to practice law from 1843 to about 1852.

Edwards Place Historic Home

This antebellum mansion has recently undergone a full-scale restoration to its 1850s appearance. Visitors will see the house as it appeared when it was owned by Benjamin S. Edwards and his family, who were relatives of Abraham Lincoln through marriage. The Lincolns were frequent guests in the home. Another Lincoln connection is the "courting couch" and "wedding piano" now displayed in the front parlor of Edwards Place. Both originally belonged to Mary Lincoln's sister, Elizabeth, with whom Mary lived before her marriage. Closed January-February.

Lincoln Tomb

Facebook.com/ StateHistoricSitesOfSpringfieldIL Donations accepted A 117-foot granite tomb in Oak Ridge Cemetery houses the remains of Abraham Lincoln, his wife and three of their four sons (Lincoln's oldest son, Robert, is buried in Arlington National Cemetery). Designed by famed sculptor Larkin Mead and completed

in 1874, this beautiful landmark is nestled in Oak Ridge Cemetery. The cemetery also contains a public receiving vault, which was constructed in 1860 and served as the scene of President Lincoln's funeral.

At the entrance to the Tomb itself, there is a bronze bust of Mr. Lincoln where visitors from around the world have stopped to rub the nose of the statue for good luck.

While at the cemetery, you can visit the gravesites of a number of other prominent Illinoisans, including governors, poet Vachel Lindsay and United Mine Workers leader John L. Lewis. The State Historic Sites at Springfield are managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Office of Land Management.

Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site

15588 History Lane, Petersburg (about 20 miles NW of Springfield on Route 97) 217-632-4000 lincolnsnewsalem.com Donations accepted A visit to Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site will transport you to a century long gone, while giving you a better understanding of life as a pioneer. See where Abraham Lincoln split rails, clerked in a store and served as postmaster, among other positions that influenced him to eventually become the Great Emancipator. Watch and interact as history comes to life through the costumed characters of the people who lived here more than 150 years ago.

While many of the structures were rebuilt over the original sites in the early 1930s, the town adheres to an impressive and painstaking attention to 1830s authentic detail. Interpreters in period dress effectively explain and demonstrate life in the 1800s.

Lincoln's New Salem has a visitor center where guests can view the film Turning Point - an introduction to Abraham Lincoln's New Salem experience. The visitor center also contains a museum exhibit, highlighting artifacts used by original New Salem residents. A souvenir shop and restaurant are also available on site. Theatre in the Park presents musicals and plays in the outdoor theater during the summer.

The site hosts a variety of special events throughout the year, such as the Candlelight Walk and Pioneer Life Summer Day Camp. Lincoln's New Salem is also home to a well-equipped campground. You can easily spend at least a day here, if not a weekend, depending on when you're visiting.

Lincoln Family Pew

For 12 years, Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln paid a fee to rent pew 20 at the First Presbyterian Church when they attended services at the church's former location at Washington and Third streets. Despite the pew rental, Abraham Lincoln never joined this – or any – church. Since then, the church has moved to South Seventh Street, which also served as the location for funeral services for Mary Todd Lincoln. Between 1890 and 1922, seven memorial windows by the worldfamous glassmaker and artist Louis Comfort Tiffany were installed. Until air conditioning proliferated beyond movie houses and taverns, their bottom portions swung open to permit better air circulation during sweltering

Looking for Lincoln Story Trail

To learn more about people and places with connections to Abraham Lincoln, keep your eyes open for the Looking for Lincoln storyboard signs. These attractive wayside exhibits tell stories that reveal interesting facts about Lincoln, individuals with whom he interacted, and the surroundings Lincoln would have experienced. There are nearly 50 Looking for Lincoln signs in Springfield alone. The signs include historical information about the specific location, a timeline, and a unique medallion to make a souvenir rubbing. Examples include locations of the office of Lincoln's dentist where he had a painful tooth extracted, the store where Lincoln bought Mary's wedding ring, and a haberdashery shop where one of Lincoln's stovepipe hats was made.

Lincoln-related stories extend far beyond Springfield in the 43 counties of the Abraham Lincoln National Heritage Area. The Looking for Lincoln Story Trail includes 265 wayside exhibits in more than 55 communities throughout central Illinois. The displays tell the Lincoln stories that are unique to each community and were developed by local historians and Lincoln enthusiasts. From Ottawa to Vandalia, Danville to Nauvoo, and communities throughout central Illinois, there are Lincoln stories to explore. Lincoln Ledger

While Lincoln is often referred to as The Great Emancipator, a glimpse at Lincoln's banking ledger shows that his life was not much different than that of the average citizen. The exhibit features bank statements for expenditures for everyday necessities, such as groceries and monthly mortgage payments. What did he buy? Visit and see for yourself!

Lincoln Depot

When Lincoln left Springfield by train from the Great Western Depot on the morning of Feb. 11, 1861, he was headed for Washington, D.C., to assume the presidency.

"To this place and the kindness of these people, I owe everything," Lincoln said, addressing the crowd which gathered to bid him farewell. His assassination in 1865 ensured he would never return alive, making that train station the last place he ever set foot in Springfield. Now called the Lincoln Depot, the station still stands at the intersection of the 10th Street rail corridor and Monroe Street. Although the depot has been remodeled several times - once due to a suspicious fire in 1968 - its appearance remains largely true to how it appeared the day of Lincoln's departure from Springfield. The first floor is open to visitors for self-quided tours, while the second floor, added around 1900, serves as a private law office, befitting Lincoln's profession. As fate would have it, Springfield attorney Jon Noll, husband of depot owner Pinky Noll, is a descendant of Lincoln's law partner, William Herndon. The depot was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2014. A short film entitled "Abraham Lincoln's Inaugural Journey" is on continuous display in the lobby.

The home contains the largest collection of site-specific, original Wright art glass and furniture and was Wright's first "blank check" commission.

In 1902, Susan Lawrence Dana commissioned architect Frank Lloyd

Wright to design a new residence around the existing family home. Dana spared no expense, and Wright went all-out in what's considered one of his first full expressions of the Prairie Style. When it was finished in 1904, the \$60,000 project was the largest residence Wright had built - 35 rooms on three levels, encompassing 12,000 square feet of living space. Dana loved to entertain, and her house was designed with that purpose in mind. The grand entrance is theatrical; one enters the house as though walking onto a stage. The three floors contain 16 varying levels.

In the early 1980s, to preserve this architectural gem, the state of Illinois acquired the residence from then-owner Thomas Publishing.

The house contains the largest collection of Wright furniture and artglass windows in the world. The house also features a panoramic mural, created by internationally renowned artist George Niedecken, who painted many murals for Wright. Susan Lawrence Dana was a Springfield-area leader of the suffrage movement and advocated for an equal rights amendment during the 1920s.

Events at the Dana-Thomas House include concerts, tours, and floral designs during the holidays. The State Historic Sites at Springfield are managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Office of Land Management.

Elijah Iles House

628 S. Seventh St. Open Sat. 12-4 p.m., or call 217-679-0797 ileshouse.org Donations accepted The Elijah Iles House is thought to date from 1837. Elijah Iles, a founder of Springfield, and wife Malinda lived here; it is the city's oldest home still in original design. There is evidence that the same architect who designed the Old State Capitol built it. It is one of the state's earliest residences in the Greek Revival style. Two of Springfield's most famous citizens, Abraham Lincoln and poet Vachel Lindsay, are known to have visited the house later. Lincoln was a quest of Robert Irwin, and they enjoyed many a card game in the parlor. Because of the house's impressive architecture and rich history, it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. It had to be moved from two earlier locations, finding its current home at the corner of Seventh and Cook streets in 1998. An elevator, accessible from special parking behind the house, provides access to visitors with limited mobility. The Farrell and Ann Gay Museum of Springfield History is in the lower

level. Upstairs is an all-new exhibit: art and furnishings from the home of Phyllis Herndon Brissenden (d. 2019).

Illinois State Museum

Visitors to the Illinois State Museum are treated to world-renowned exhibits and engaging educational programs. The Museum tells the rich story of Illinois' land, life, people and art. Three floors of permanent and changing exhibits display a vast array of items drawn from the Museum's collection of over 13.5 million objects. Adults and children alike will enjoy traveling back in time to the days when a shallow, tropical seacovered Illinois or Ice Age behemoths roamed the glacial expenses, as well as learning about 12,000 years of Illinois' human history. Rotating art exhibitions demonstrate the rich tradition of both decorative and fine art within Illinois. This museum truly is a Springfield gem.

Of note are Springfield's roles as a haven along the Underground Railroad, the Race Riot of 1908 which led to the formation of the NAACP and the lifesaving commodities and guidance provided by Black-owned businesses during the Jim Crow era.

Vachel Lindsay Home State Historic Site

He was born on Nov. 10, 1879, and died on Dec. 5, 1931. Both events took place in the Lindsay family home



across the street from the Illinois Governor's Mansion. Lindsay's father, Thomas, was a physician; his mother, Catherine, was an artist and social reformer. Lindsay was supposed to follow in his father's footsteps, and after high school he attended Hiram College in Ohio to study medicine, but he eventually dropped out to attend art schools in Chicago and New York.

In the early 20th century, Lindsay set out on a series of tramps across America. At the conclusion of one of these trips, his poem "General William Booth Enters into Heaven," a eulogy to the founder of the Salvation Army, was published in Chicago's *Poetry* magazine. The poem brought him national attention, and subsequent works garnered international acclaim. Some of his best-known poems include "The Congo" and "Abraham Lincoln Walks at Midnight."

Lindsay's family home, now a state historic site, has been restored to depict life in 1917, when Lindsay's parents still played an active role in community life. Examples of Lindsay's poetry and art, not a part of the house at that time, have been added to showcase the poet. Events include poetry readings and writing workshops. The State Historic Sites at Springfield are managed by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Office of Land Management.

Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Museum *629 S. Seventh St.*

Donations accepted As the soldiers who fought in the bloody Civil War returned to civilian life, many retained the bonds of brotherhood forged in battle. Several fraternal organizations of Civil War veterans sprang up, and the Grand Army of the Republic, established in Decatur in 1866, became a leader among them, with more than 409,000 members who previously served in the Union forces. The Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Museum in Springfield memorializes those veterans and sits within walking distance of the Lincoln Home and across the street from the Elijah Iles House

The collection includes tintype photos by Mathew Brady, rare drawings of the infamous Andersonville and Libby prison camps, and a complete list of Union soldiers held there during the war. Owned by the National Woman's Relief Corps, an auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, the museum also maintains many volumes of Civil War history that may be examined on-site.

Springfield and Central Illinois African American History Museum

The Museum opened in 2012, and is located at the main entrance to Oak Ridge Cemetery, within walking distance of Lincoln's Tomb. Exhibits tell authentic stories about African American life in central Illinois, past and present. Some of the exhibits featured include: The Middle Passage, documenting the slave trade; "Something So Horrible, The Springfield Race Riot of 1908," which led to the formation of the NAACP; Oldest Springfield African American Churches dating back to 1838 and Central Illinois Pioneer Families from the 1800s to the present. These extensively researched exhibits are interactive and have audio visual components.

World War II Illinoi's Veterans

Memorial in Oak Ridge Cemetery was constructed to honor the 987,000 men and women from Illinois who served our country during World War II, when 22,000 Illinois citizens gave their lives in pursuit of liberty. The memorial design centerpiece is a globe 12 feet in diameter, which represents the world in conflict during World War II. It is surrounded by a granite wall engraved with the names and dates of major battles of the Pacific and European theaters of war. A central plaza of personalized engraved bricks completes the design.

The Illinois Korean War

Memorial, dedicated on June 16, 1996, is also located in Oak Ridge Cemetery. The monument's centerpiece is a 12-foot bronze bell surrounded by four larger-than-life warriors representing the five branches of the armed forces – Army, Navy, Coast Guard, Air Force and Marines. The names of over 1,700 Illinoisans killed in Korea are inscribed along eight walls of the memorial's granite base.

The Illinois Vietnam Veterans **Memorial** was dedicated in May 1988. The memorial incorporates five black granite walls upon which are inscribed the 2,970 names of Illinoisans who died or are still missing. The five black granite walls form interior courtyards, one for each of the five branches of service. Each branch of service is designated by its insignia, which is etched on inner 15-foothigh gray granite walls. Also inscribed on the gray granite walls are the names of those listed as missing in action or as prisoners of war, as well as the names of the highest decorated veterans in each branch of service. An eternal flame burns atop the memorial where the gray granite walls converge.

Dedicated in 2016, **The Illinois**

Purple Heart Memorial honors recipients of the Purple Heart killed or wounded from all wars the United States has participated in. The center of the Memorial includes an eight-foot piece of black granite with an engraving of a Purple Heart on it. The other side of the stone features a quote from William Shakespeare's Henry V: "We few, we happy few, we band of brothers; For he to-day that sheds his blood with me shall be my brother." Two smaller black granite stones to the left and right of the centerpiece of the Memorial feature the engravings of four soldiers.

Guard, the Illinois State Military Museum is dedicated to the state's military heritage and collecting, preserving, interpreting and exhibiting the military artifacts associated with the citizensoldier of Illinois. The Citizen-Soldier exhibit features the military experiences of famous Illinois soldiers such as Carl Sandburg, Robert McCormick, John A. Logan and Abraham Lincoln. at the target board used by Abraham Lincoln in 1863 to test-fire the new Spencer rifle, or ask about the museum's collection of Civil War flags currently held in storage but viewable by the public. A realistic World War II scene depicts Illinois' 132nd Infantry in combat on Guadalcanal in 1942. Displayed outside are restored Vietnam War-era AH-1 Cobra and UH-1 "Huey" helicopters and an M60A-3 tank.

Located in the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, this teaching museum covers various aspects of healing, including pharmaceutical, surgical, dental and alternative medicine. Treatments through the centuries come to life in permanent and changing exhibits. Named for long-practicing Springfield physician Emmett Pearson, the museum features a dental exhibit, a complete homeopathic dispensary and an entire 1900 drugstore from Canton, Illinois, with its many apothecary jars and vials. School groups and practicing physicians often visit the museum to hear lectures. Open by appointment.

Air Combat Museum

The Air Combat Museum showcases the role of military aviation and features a collection of historic aircraft and aviation memorabilia including a P-51 Mustang, a Vought F4U-5 Corsair, a P40 under restoration, a Beechcraft AT-11 used to train bombardiers in World War II, a 1931 Fleet Model 9 biplane and a Soko G-21 Galeb Yugoslavian jet, among others. A WWI-replica Sopwith Camel is being built on the premises. For individual visits, donations are suggested. Group tours are \$40, by appointment only.

Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War Museum

Visit the oldest brick building in Sangamon County and second-oldest in the state of Illinois. Built in 1824 by the Broadwell family, it was the stagecoach stop, inn and tavern on the old post road to Beardstown. The 14-acre pioneer site includes two log cabins, both moved to the site in the early 1960s. The Batterton cabin was constructed in 1817 and represents early pioneer life, perhaps similar to the cabin John Broadwell would have constructed when he arrived in 1819. Two large 1850s-era barns were also moved to the site and reconstructed. One barn holds the pioneer agriculture museum and the other has been updated as a venue rental space and includes an open-air pavilion with a large stone fireplace. The Rustemeyer Blacksmith Shop, the last active blacksmith shop in Springfield, has also been relocated here. Don't forget to stop by the reconstructed school house; rumor has it that a young Abraham Lincoln would stop and visit his friend Mentor Graham, who was a teacher at the school, and listen to the students read their lessons. In 1842, the first Whig Party state convention was held at Clayville, named after candidate Henry Clays. Guided tours are available by appointment, or visitors may just wander the grounds.

Located in the original 1831-32 Col. Matthew Rogers Building. On Aug. 3, 1837, Abraham Lincoln and most of the other "Long Nine" legislators from Sangamon County were present at the Rogers Building to be honored at a banquet for helping pass the bill to move the state capital to Springfield. Exhibits include recreated banquet area, audionarrated dioramas showing Lincoln's activities in the Athens area while he was living in nearby New Salem, a biography room, history room and remnants of the "Lincoln Stairs" – used by Lincoln and the others to reach the second-floor banquet area. Tours are self-guided. Open Tuesday-Sunday, 1-5 p.m., from June 1 through Aug. 29.

Historic Edwards Place, art galleries and family events

The Springfield Art Association is at the heart of Springfield's thriving arts and culture scene. Boasting two art galleries, an art school, a Lincoln-era historic house museum and a calendar packed with family-friendly events, there is always something to see or do at the SAA.

For the art aficionado, the Springfield Art Association offers two galleries that are open to the public free of charge. The M.G. Nelson Family Gallery keeps its finger on the pulse of contemporary art by hosting monthly exhibits featuring local, regional and international artists. In the mood to see or buy what central Illinois' top artistic talent has created? Head downtown to the SAA Collective gallery at Fifth and Washington streets in the historic Broadwell Pharmacy Building. The SAA Collective showcases the work of more than 70 member artists in a variety of media, including painting, photography, ceramics, fibers and jewelry. It's the perfect place to go for a one-of-a-kind gift.

If you are looking for a unique

experience, the SAA offers "One Nighters," these one-night workshops are a chance to make something in one night in the ceramics, metals or glass studios on the SAA campus.

The Springfield Art Association's main campus and historic Edwards Place are located at 700 N. Fourth Street. Parking is free in the adjacent lot or on the street.

The M.G. Nelson Family Gallery is open Mondays-Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., admission is free.

Historic Edwards Place is open March through December on TuesdaySaturday with guided tours at 1 p.m. and self-guided tours from 2 to 3 p.m. Tours are \$5 per person; children 10 and under are free. Tours by appointment in January and February and on Mondays throughout the year.

The SAA Collective gallery is located at 105 North Fifth Street. It is open Wednesday through Saturday 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Check www.springfieldart.org and www.edwardsplace.org for more information about the Springfield Art Association, Edwards Place and all the events they offer. For history lovers, the Art Association offers the opportunity to tour historic Edwards Place. This antebellum mansion was the Art Association's headquarters in the early 20th century and has recently undergone a full-scale interior restoration to its 1850s appearance.

Today, visitors to Edwards Place will see the house as it appeared when it was owned by Benjamin S. Edwards and his family. Benjamin was the youngest son of Illinois territorial and third governor, Ninian Edwards. His brother, Ninian W. Edwards, was married to Elizabeth Todd, Mary Lincoln's oldest sister, making the Edwards family relatives of Abraham Lincoln through marriage. The Lincolns were frequently guests at the Edwards' elaborate dinners, parties and picnics.

No Lincoln buff should leave Springfield without seeing the "courting couch" or "wedding piano," both now displayed in the Edwards Place front parlor. Both originally belonged to Mary Lincoln's sister Elizabeth, with whom Mary lived before her marriage. Lincoln and Mary would sit together on the sofa while they were courting and listen to Elizabeth play the piano. In 1842, both the sofa and piano were silent witnesses to the Lincolns' wedding ceremony, which took place in Elizabeth's parlor.

You won't find velvet ropes or designated pathways in Edwards Place. Rather, you are invited in without boundaries to fully explore the house's history and secrets: fragments of original wallpaper and plaster left in place and on display, original family furnishings and archaeological artifacts recovered on site. There are also regular special events designed to bring the past to life, such as visits from Abraham Lincoln, tea parties, piano concerts, plays and even murder mysteries.

DANA-THOMAS HOUSE – A FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT DESIGN

The Dana-Thomas House is one of the most unique and lavish structures designed by Frank Lloyd Wright during his early Prairie period. The home was built for Springfield socialite Susan Lawrence Dana. She was known for her hospitality, unforgettable parties and concerts as well as community, social and political involvement. Perhaps the most complete of all early Wright dwellings, it was never significantly altered and has over 100 pieces of original Wright-designed oak furniture, 250 examples of art glass windows, light fixtures and lamps. Connecting the main living quarters to the gallery and library is a sixty-foot long pergola hallway beneath which is a bowling lane, billiard room and walk-in vault.

Take in the sights and sounds of the seat of Illinois government

Illinois State Capitol 401 S. Second St.

217-782-2099 Illinois boasts a stunning State Capitol, and in recent years the legislative chambers and multifloor west wing were magnificently restored. It is well worth visiting this National Historic Landmark. Construction began on the sixth and current Illinois Capitol in 1868 after officials determined that more space was needed for government business. The building took 20 years to complete and cost more than \$4.5 million. The first legislative session in the new Capitol was held in 1877, but the structure wasn't finished for another decade. Designed in the shape of a Latin cross and capped by a 361-foot-high dome, the building stands 74 feet taller than the U.S. Capitol.

In addition to watching Illinois politicians from the balcony-level seating area, visitors can view the awe-inspiring artwork, statues and paintings inside the limestone Italian Renaissance Revival building. Murals, a variety of marbles and a unique architectural design add to the elegance and grace of Illinois' center of government.

Guided tours are the best way to learn more about the historic building,

Illinois state government and the history of Illinois represented by statues, murals, portraits, paintings and other artwork. Free tours are given every half-hour on weekdays and start on the first floor, north wing. Visitors must remain with the tour guide on weekends, so go during the week if you want to explore. Enter through the east door. Visitors must go through metal detectors. Park for free at the Capitol Complex Visitors Center, 425 S. College St.

Open many holidays, but call ahead first.

GovernorsMansion Free

Built in 1855, the Illinois Governor's Mansion is one of the oldest and most historic governor's mansions in the U.S. The Mansion reopened in July 2018 after a spectacular, privately funded three-year renovation. It is now fully ADA accessible and has professionally trained docents for guided tours, as well as expanded programming and an all-new visitor center. Rooms are dedicated specifically to historic events, including the Columbian Exposition and past Illinois governors. Individuals and groups who would like to tour the Governor's Mansion are required to have a reservation in advance.

Bunn to Lost Bridge Trail

This 1.5 mile trail is an extension of the Lost Bridge Trail from Rochester. Street crossings on Dirksen Pkwy. and Taylor Avenue

Trail heads at IDOT Building (2300 Dirksen Pkway. parking lot) and Abundant Faith Christian Center (2525 Taylor Avenue parking lot).

Interurban Trail

This bicycle and pedestrian trail is 8.3 miles long. It begins at the corner of Wabash Avenue and MacArthur Boulevard and proceeds in a southerly direction following the abandoned Interurban Railroad rightof-way to the town of Chatham. The asphalt surface trail is open year-round for biking, skating, jogging and hiking.

Trail heads at Wabash Avenue and Park Street (parking lot), Hazel Dell and West Grand, Woodside Road and Pedigo Lane (parking lot).

Lost Bridge Trail

This trail stretches nearly five miles,

from Springfield's east side to the town of Rochester, and is built on the Old Baltimore and Ohio Railroad line.

Trail head at Illinois Dept. of Transportation (2300 Dirksen Pkwy.) parking lot.

Sangamon Valley Trail

This 11.5-mile trail is a mostly shaded route from the southwest Centennial Park north to Stuart Park and extending further north to Irwin Bridge Road It includes scenic bridges which puts hikers and cyclists at eye level with the tree tops.

Trail heads at Centennial Park (5751 Bunker Hill Road, parking lot), Stuart Park (1800 Winch Ln., parking lot) and a lot off Cantral Creek Road, about half a mile west of Brown Road and a mile from the Irwin Bridge Road endpoint.

Wabash Trail

The paved trail extends three miles along Springfield's southwest side, beginning at Robbins Road and continuing all the way to Park Street. Great for rollerblading, hiking and biking. Also connects to the Interurban Trail via a connecting sidewalk. Trail heads at BJ Grand Salon (3055 Robbins Road) and Wabash Avenue and Park Avenue.

Springfield's parks

Adams Wildlife Sanctuary

2315 E. Clear Lake Ave. 217-544-2473 illinoisaudubon.org. This is the perfect place to take a quick nature walk without driving out of town. Just off one of Springfield's busiest streets, Clear Lake Avenue, the sanctuary is a hidden jewel that's accessible in minutes. Once a mid-19th-century farm, it's now a wooded haven for birds and is owned by the Illinois Audubon Society. One trail takes 15 minutes to complete; a longer trail takes 45 minutes. The visitor center offers information about the trees, plants and birds commonly encountered. Visitors can also tour the restored 1850s Margery Adams farmhouse.

Carpenter Park Nature Preserve

IL 124 and *I*-55 217-544-1751 *springfieldparks.org* This lovely park has 434 acres, lined on one side by the shores of the Sangamon River and The Rail golf course on the other. It is located in the north side of town, west of Business Route 55 (Peoria Road). A winding park road leads to a clearing with a parking lot, historic stone shelter, a picnic area and a map. The park is primarily used for hiking and nature observation. Part of the park is an Illinois Nature Preserve.

Centennial Park

Bunker Hill Rd. and Lenhart Rd. 217-544-1751 springfieldparks.org Part of southwest Springfield, this 190acre park features skateboard facilities, bocce ball courts and a 100 ft. sledding hill, in addition to a playground and outdoor picnic areas.

Lincoln Memorial Garden & Nature Center

2301 E. Lake Shore Dr. 217-529-1111 lincolnmemorialgarden.org A woodland and prairie garden with over five miles of trails lead you on a journey through the Illinois landscape Lincoln would have known. Depending on the season you visit, you could discover springtime dogwoods in full bloom, colorful prairie wildflowers of summer, burnished autumn leaves or snow-covered maple trees bursting with sap. Located on the shores of Lake Springfield and designed by landscape



architect Jens Jensen, the garden is open daily from sunrise to sunset. Be sure to visit the Garden's Nature Center and Split Rail Gift Shop.

Lincoln Park

217-753-2800 springfieldparks.org/parks/lincoln/ Lincoln Park, located on the north side of Springfield, is an 88-acre site added to the park district in 1905. Its design and many features date back to its original development, including a historic lagoon and pavilion. The park includes disc-golf courses, tennis courts, shuffleboard and a horseshoe park, plus the Nelson Recreation Center with an outdoor swimming pool and two indoor ice rinks.

Southwind Park and Erin's Pavilion

4965 S. Second St. 217-585-2941 springfieldparks.org Every inch of this 80-acre park is ADA accessible, serving as a national model for inclusion for all people. Stroll 2.5 miles of urban trails and enjoy the sensory gardens, playground and fishing piers. The park also has ecofriendly wetlands, a wind turbine, solar panels and a geothermal system.

Washington Park

South Grand Ave. and MacArthur Blvd. 217-544-1751

springfieldparks.org/parks/washington/ Washington Park is a 150-acre site just a couple miles from downtown Springfield. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, it is Springfield's largest and most active park. The Washington Park Botanical Garden, at the far west side of the park, features a glass-domed conservatory, gallery and greenhouses. The park is also home to Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon, the sixth largest in the world. Washington Park is also home to two fishing ponds stocked with catfish and trout, picnic shelters, playgrounds, public tennis courts, nature trails and bike and jogging paths.

Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon 1740 W. Fayette Ave. 217-546-3853

The Thomas Rees Memorial Carillon is an icon in Washington Park. It was a gift of Senator Thomas Rees, publisher of the Illinois State Register from 1881 until his death in 1933. Rees attributed his great interest in bells to visiting carillons

in Belgium and The Netherlands. He left specific instructions in his will regarding the number of bells and the location of the carillon.

A carillonneur plays the bells manually using a keyboaRoad To more fully appreciate the carillon, take in a carillon concert. From May 1 through Sept. 30 concerts are on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. and Saturdays and Sundays at 2 p.m. From October through April, the concerts are on Wednesdays at noon and Sundays at 2 and 4 p.m. The worldrenowned International Carillon Festival is held annually in June.

Take a carillon tour to see the bells up close, learn how the carillon is played and enjoy a spectacular view of Washington Park and surrounding landmarks. Tours are offered May 1-Sept. 30 on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays from noon to 6 p.m. Admission is \$4 for adults and \$3 for children ages 5-15.

Springfield offers many other welcoming parks, nature spots, gardens and prairie wilderness. All Springfield parks are open dawn to dusk. For more information about Springfield's city-operated parks and golf courses, visit springfieldparks.org/parks. When was the last time you experienced your ...

The nightlife Where to find live entertainment in the capital city

The nightlife of Springfield and surrounding communities is diverse and robust. Blues, folk, jazz, rock, country, hip-hop, dance music, open mic events and karaoke nights are well represented on any given night in central Illinois and the capital city. Solid local acts playing original and cover material mix with national touring bands on the road from St. Louis to Chicago or between Indianapolis and Kansas City to create a fertile atmosphere for vibrant entertainment.

Local, regional and national touring acts of various genres take the stage weekly at several clubs around the city. Danenberger Family Vineyard's Wine Rocks (12341 Irish Road, New Berlin) and Weebles (4136 Peoria Road) host a variety of acts that run the gamut from singer-songwriter types to Americana groups and local cover bands. The Curve Inn (3219 S. Sixth St.) books live, local music in a heated outdoor venue every weekend from 6 to 10 p.m., then continues the entertainment inside until 3 a.m. with a DJ.

There are too many venues to mention, ranging from coffee shops to bars and wineries, with local bands and musicians of all flavors, including rock, bluegrass, blues, country and pop

music. For a complete listing of what's going on in and around the capital city on any given week, check the arts and entertainment listings in *Illinois Times*, the city's free weekly newspaper, which also publishes *Capital City Visitor*. Look for the numerous *IT* newsstands throughout downtown, as well as at area hotels, restaurants and stores or check the online calendar at illinoistimes.com.

Blues

Every Monday night starting around 8 p.m., the Illinois Central Blues Club (ICBC) sponsors a different band at the Alamo (115 N. Fifth St.). Local, regional and national acts have enlivened this wonderful music experience during the 30-plus years of Blue Mondays. Watch for special blues events regularly sponsored by the active ICBC at different venues in town.

Jazz

Jazz in all its varied forms is represented at certain nightclubs and restaurants. On the near west side of town, the Lime Street Cafe (951 S. Durkin Dr.) serves up jazz-style musicians with an occasional foray into classic rock 'n' roll.

Comedy

If laughter is what you're after, look no further than Donnie B's Comedy Club (217-391-JOKE or donniebs.com for location and tickets) or head north of town to the Mason City Limits Comedy Club (114 E. Chestnut, Mason City). Both clubs feature nationally known touring comedians every Friday and Saturday night, with occasional open mics for the aspiring comic.

Acoustic

Singer-songwriters and acoustic music performers are in abundance around town and in the area. Venues with regular shows include Pease's at Bunn Gourmet (2941 Plaza Dr.), Always After Five (2741 S. Sixth St.), Hand of Fate Brewing Company (107 E. Douglas St., Petersburg) Farmhouse Restaurant (3001 Veterans Parkway, inside Harvest Market) and 3Sixteen Wine Bar (316 N. Main St., Chatham).

Chilli (otherwise known as Chili)

Chili is a popular menu item in Springfield, but here it is more commonly spelled chilli, not chili. The first chilli restaurant in Springfield, and the first to call it "chilli," was the Dew Chilli Parlor which opened in 1909. Although the original location is now closed, the secret recipe lives on at Dew Chilli at 2312 Wabash Ave., along with Dew Chilli Pub and Grill locations at 301 North Grand Ave. and 2690 S. Dirksen Parkway. Another local favorite, which was established by Joe Rogers in 1945 as the Den Chili Parlor, is now called The Chili Parlor, located at 820 S. Ninth Street. If you eat a bowl of Firebrand chili at The Chili Parlor, your name will be memorialized on the wall.

Uniquely Springfield Horseshoes

You haven't truly experienced Springfield until you've eaten a horseshoe (or at least a ponyshoe). Springfield originated this concoction, consisting of thick-cut slices of bread topped with meat, then potatoes, and cheese sauce over the top. Chef Joe Schweska of the Leland Hotel created the horseshoe in the late 1920s. The Leland Hotel, now an office building, was located on the corner of Sixth and Capitol streets. The original horseshoe was made with ham cut in the shape of a horseshoe, wedges of potato (the nails), a Welsh rarebit-type cheese sauce and was served on a hot metal plate (the anvil). Today's horseshoe typically has two slices of Texas toast, your choice of meat (hamburger, ham, turkey, chicken or shrimp), French fries and a rich cheese sauce smothered over the top. Most people believe the secret is the cheese sauce. A smaller version with just one slice of bread is called a ponyshoe. You can find horseshoes on many menus in Springfield with different variations on the classic version.

There's as much space devoted to brewing and planned distilling operations, and you can see it all from the bar. Early offerings have featured off-the-beaten path versions of IPAs and wheat beers.

Buzz Bomb Brewing Co.

Housed in an historic mansion nestled against a sizeable outdoor beer garden to accommodate summertime crowds, Obed's is a comfortable walk from Lincoln's Home and other downtown historic sites. Most of the inside is used for restaurant space, but there is also a good-sized bar inside and plenty of outdoor seating. The food is excellent and affordable, with lunches in the \$8 to \$10 range and dinner offerings less than twice that. Tap offerings are expansive and often adventuresome. Try a flight of micro brewed beers, and be sure to sample the flatbread pizza, made from grains left over from the brewing process. The atmosphere is laid back, with the beer garden featuring bocce ball courts and welcoming dogs.

Great surroundings with soft lighting that makes you relax even before the first glass.

The food is good and simple - nothing fancier than salads, sandwiches and flatbread pizza and cheap, with everything priced below \$10.
